	*Unaccredited practices of any size are only eligible for Grants of \$25,000.
What can the Grants be used for?	The Grants can be used by general practices and ACCHS to invest in innovation, training, equipment, and minor capital works across <u>one or more</u> of the below investment streams:
	1. <b>Enhance digital health capability</b> – to fast-track the benefits of a more connected healthcare system in readiness to meet future standards.
	2. <b>Upgrade infection prevention and control arrangements</b> – to support the safe, face to face assessment of patients with symptoms of potentially infectious respiratory disease (e.g., COVID, influenza).
	3. <b>Maintain AND/OR achieve accreditation</b> against the Royal Australian College of General Practitioner (RACGP) <u>Standards for General Practice</u> , under the General Practice Accreditation Scheme – to promote quality and safety in general practice.

	<ul> <li>ACCHOs that deliver general practice services that are not owned or operated by a state, territory or local government agency or body.</li> </ul>
What is the definition of a general practice?	A <b>general practice</b> , as per the RACGP definition for the purposes of practice accreditation against the <u>Standards for General</u> <u>Practice</u> , that meets all the following three core criteria:
	<ul> <li>A. the practice or health service operates within the model of general practice described in the RACGP's definition of general practice.</li> <li>B. general practitioner (GP) services are predominantly* of a general practice nature</li> <li>C. the practice or health service is capable of meeting all</li> </ul>
	mandatory indicators in the RACGP <u>Standards for General</u> <u>Practice</u> .
	*'Predominantly' is defined by the Health Insurance Regulations 2018 (made under the <i>Health Insurance Act 1973</i> ) as 'more than 50% of the practitioner's clinical time, and more than 50% of the services for which Medicare benefits are claimed, are in general practice.
	Please refer to the RACGP <u>fact sheet</u> to assist in determining whether a health service meets the definition of a general practice.
Does my practice need to be accredited or registered for accreditation to apply for the GP Grants Program?	No, a practice does <u>not</u> need to be accredited or registered for RACGP practice accreditation against the <u>Standards for General</u> <u>Practices</u> to be eligible for the Program.
	However, an unaccredited practice will only be eligible for a one- off Grant of \$25,000.

Grant?	The General Practice Grants Program provides the flexibility for applicants to identify investments within one or more of the three investment streams that best address individual practice needs.
	The Grants can be used for staff training, purchase of equipment and/or services (including consultant services), innovation, and minor capital works, and the reimbursement of staff time associated with these activities – for any of the three investment streams.
	Please refer to DHAC's <u>Quick Reference Guide</u> for examples of possible investment activities under each stream, noting this is a guide only and it is recognised that each practice will have different investment needs.

How will Grants be distributed?	Grants will be distributed via Primary Health Networks (PHNs).
	The Grants for general practices in Western Australia will be distributed by WAPHA, and for WA Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Services (ACCHS) by the National Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (NACCHO).
