# Practice Connect Latest news and updates

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### PIP QI update

PIP QI continues to be a focus for the WA Primary Health Alliance (WAPHA) Practice Support team as we reach the end of the Incentive's first month.

If your practice intends to participate in PIP QI, but has not yet registered via HPOS, we encourage you to do so immediately. If you are having difficulties with this process, please review our FAQs for a visual guide to registration through HPOS, or contact the Department of Human Services for further troubleshooting.

If you have registered for PIP QI but have not yet informed us, please make sure you contact your Primary Health Liaison or Facilitator (<a href="https://bit.ly/32Cv0f8">https://bit.ly/32Cv0f8</a>) or call Practice Assist on 1800 22 77 47, and let us know you have registered. We will need to confirm that we have your correct PIP ID recorded, and confirm your current data sharing status. You must also ensure that you register for PIP QI (with the Department of Human Services) *prior* to submitting a PIP Eligible Data Set to WAPHA. Data sets submitted before a practice's PIP QI participation has been confirmed will not be considered eligible.

A reminder that practices have until October 15 to successfully submit a PIP Eligible Data Set to WAPHA as part of their eligibility for a Quality Improvement Incentive payment.

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### Shared servers, PIP QI, and data sharing

Practices that currently use a shared server environment will need to consider their requirements for sharing individual data sets as part of the PIP QI. Where practices have individual PIP IDs, but share a server, they will need to submit individualised (that is, per practice) data sets to WAPHA for each of the PIP QI-participating sites to be eligible for an incentive payment.

As there are different ways in which this can be configured, we recommend that, if this situation applies to your practice(s), you contact your Primary Health Liaison or Facilitator as soon as possible to discuss the best way to manage your particular circumstances.

### Changes of practice ownership, amalgamation, and relocation

Practices that are participating in PIP QI, and particularly those utilising PEN CS, need to ensure that WAPHA is advised of key changes to the practice. This includes changes of ownership, amalgamations, relocations, and closures. If your practice undergoes business changes, we may need to re-issue data sharing agreements, re-allocate or recall PEN licences, and / or update primary contact and other practice information to ensure we are managing and maintaining the confidentiality of your practice data, and communicating with the appropriate practice representatives.

The Department of Human Services has defined processes for managing changes of practice details, including forms for *Change of Practice Ownership* IP010 (<a href="https://bit.ly/2Xell5T">https://bit.ly/2Xell5T</a>), *Change of Practice Details* IP005 (<a href="https://bit.ly/2Ke1cyK">https://bit.ly/2Ke1cyK</a>), and *Practice Closure or Withdrawal* IP007 (<a href="https://bit.ly/2MFmNIA">https://bit.ly/2MFmNIA</a>). If your practice undergoes any changes that require you to notify the Department of Human Services for the purpose of the Practice Incentives Program, please let your Primary Health Liaison or Facilitator know also so that we can apply any associated updates to your practice profile with WAPHA.

## What information will WAPHA provide to the Department of Health for PIP QI?

This question is frequently asked of PHNs by practices that are unsure of what information will initially be shared with the Department of Health (DoH) for the purpose of the PIP Quality Incentive payment.

To confirm a practice's eligibility for a quarterly payment, WAPHA will send a report to the DoH which confirms the following details of eligible practices:

- PIP ID
- practice name
- practice address
- date of successful data extract (or technical code relating to an extraction error or other issue)

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## Reminder – new schedule for automated data extractions for WA general practices

A reminder to all practices in WA using PEN CS CAT4 Scheduler that your data extraction will move to the period between the 9<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> of each month from September onwards. This is to align the automated data extractions with the reporting requirements of the Practice Incentives Program and ensure practices have the best opportunity to achieve a successful extraction within each quarter. Bringing the extraction date forward ensures three extractions are scheduled within the quarter, and allows additional time to address failed extractions while remaining within the eligible period.

Practice processes should not be impacted by this change as Scheduler works remotely to extract data at a time of day convenient to the practice. If your practice does not have Scheduler installed, please review the Practice Assist FAQ website (<a href="https://bit.ly/2XJVdcF">https://bit.ly/2XJVdcF</a>) where there is a question relating to compatible software. If your software is compatible with Scheduler, we recommend you contact PEN CS to discuss installation.

### Recommended schedule for manual data extractions

In concurrence with the changes outlined above to automated data extractions, for those practices that manually extract data, we recommend you utilise a similar schedule, and perform your data extractions towards the start of the month. While you only need one successful extraction per quarter of the PIP Eligible Data Set, you may wish to perform the three extractions per quarter for your own performance analysis, or to ensure that you have back-up data sets.

Remember that data extracted in the last two weeks of the payment quarter will not be considered eligible. For the August – October quarter, extractions must occur between 1 August and 15 October for the data set to be eligible.

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### The Australian Charter of Healthcare Rights - second edition

The Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care (ACSQHC) recently published the second edition of the Australian Charter of Healthcare Rights (the Charter). The Charter describes what consumers, or someone they care for, can expect when receiving healthcare, and the second edition of the Charter reflects an increased focus on person-centred care, and empowers consumers to take an active role in their healthcare. Healthcare rights apply to all people in all places where health care is provided in Australia, including public and private hospitals, day procedure services, general practice, and other community health services.

The Commission is also developing a range of tools and resources to help consumers and healthcare providers understand and use the Charter. ## LiveLighter calls for urgent obesity action with new 13 Cancers campaign

Cancer Council Western Australia (CCWA) has launched the next LiveLighter® public education campaign that urges Western Australians to reduce their cancer risk by reducing sugary drink consumption (<a href="https://bit.ly/33TD8bL">https://bit.ly/33TD8bL</a>).

The new LiveLighter® advertisement, which has never been seen before in WA, will focus on the contribution of sugary drinks to dangerous toxic fat around the organs which can trigger certain cancers.

The campaign has been developed alongside new Cancer Council Australia-funded research published in the International Journal of Cancer that shows over 200,000 cancer cases could be avoided in Australia over the next 25 years if all Australian adults maintained a healthy weight and met the physical activity guidelines for cancer prevention.

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### Accreditation tip - patient identification

### RACGP Standards for general practices 5th ed (Criterion C6.1)

The use of approved patient identifiers in general practice is a vital component of patient safety and confidentiality. According to the RACGP *Standards for general practices*, "Failure to correctly verify a patient can have serious, potentially life-threatening consequences for the patient." Thus, the Standards require that practices have a system for patient identification that uses three approved patient identifiers, and that this system is used at *every* patient encounter. For example, within a single appointment, a patient should be asked to verify his or her identity when making the appointment, when presenting for the appointment, and when seeing each clinician.

Approved patient identifiers include

- name (family and given names together are one identifier)
- date of birth
- gender (self-identified)
- address
- patient health record number (if such a system exists in your practice)
- Individual Healthcare Identifier (or IHI, issued by the Department of Human Services)

Medicare numbers are **not** considered approved patient health identifiers, as some patients do not have Medicare cards, and family members may share a Medicare number. When asking a patient for identification, the practice team member must ask the patient to state at least three identifiers. It is important that staff do not offer the information and ask the patient to confirm it.

The prevailing issues associated with applying a consistent patient identification process are patient concerns about privacy, and patient annoyance at being asked to identify themselves to practice staff with whom they are familiar.

In the first instance, there are recommendations for methods of self-identification that support privacy and confidentiality. The RACGP suggests that the patient produce a form of government-issued, photographic identification (such as a driving licence) that confirms at least three of the approved patient identifiers. Some practices have implemented a system where their business card has a patient identification (and emergency contact) section on the back that can be completed by the patient. This has a two-fold benefit, allowing the patient to present the card as a way of confirming his or her identity, as well as carrying the details of both the emergency contact and general practice which could then be accessible should a health emergency occur.

To accommodate patients who are unhappy about being asked to identify themselves, you might display signage around the practice to explain why you will ask a patient for identifiers. It is common for practices to have patients with similar names, addresses, and/or dates of birth, and mismatching a patient with a health record can have serious consequences. Being confident in explaining the need for correct patient identification can help you successfully engage your patients in the process.

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### **Immunisation update**

### WA Schedule: MMR II brand added to Adult program

A minor amendment has been made to the WA Immunisation schedule (<a href="https://bit.ly/2I5UTNm">https://bit.ly/2I5UTNm</a>) for the State Adult MMR Program. To ensure continued vaccine supply for our state program, MMR II brand vaccine has been added as an alternative to the Priorix brand. The ordering system will reflect the brand available at the time of ordering.

### Priorix brand vaccine expiry dates

GSK has announced that a limited number of batches of Priorix brand MMR vaccine show 2 expiry dates (a shorter expiry date for diluent) which could cause confusion. Please note: If you come across a vial with various expiry dates, please refer to the earliest expiry date on the vaccine components as it reflects the expiry dates for the whole product. The *Priorix expiry date clarification letter* (https://bit.ly/2NAygT1) will be sent with all shipments of the affected batch.

#### MMRV vaccine brands available

Please note that ATAGI recommends that children up to 14 years of age can receive both MMRV vaccine brands (ProQuad and Priorix Tetra).

ATAGI also recommends that MMRV vaccine should not be used routinely as the 1st dose of MMR-containing vaccine in children aged <4 years.

#### New reminder letters for children and adolescents overdue for vaccination

The Department of Human Services (DHS) has commenced sending additional reminder letters to parents of children overdue for vaccination.


The additional letters sent to families (who are not in receipt of family assistance payments) are for children aged 7, 13, 15, 19 and 49 months (sample letter <a href="https://bit.ly/2Nyek36">https://bit.ly/2Nyek36</a>). Adolescents who are overdue for their childhood and adolescent vaccinations will be sent letters when they are aged 14.5, 17 and 18 years (sample letter <a href="https://bit.ly/2KYlbS1">https://bit.ly/2KYlbS1</a>).

These additional letters advise individuals to contact their GP to receive missed vaccine/s whilst they are still eligible to receive funded catch-up immunisations through the NIP (at 10, 21 and 54 months).

#### Reminder for immunisation providers to report all instances of vaccine wastage

All instances of vaccine wastage must be reported using the *Cold Chain Breach and Vaccine Wastage* form (<a href="https://bit.ly/2zzolVP">https://bit.ly/2zzolVP</a>) when vaccines are discarded for the any of the following reasons:

- Vaccine expiry
- Vaccine vial breakage
- Vaccine not drawn up properly
- Patient changing their mind once vial is opened
- Vaccine deemed not viable after a cold chain breach
- Any other instance where unopened or opened vials are discarded.





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### **NPS MedicineWise update**

If your GPs have never tried an NPS MedicineWise Educational Visit, the next topic is a great place to start.

From October 2019, NPS MedicineWise are offering a topic on *Opioids and the bigger picture when treating chronic pain*.

This topic provides clarity on the role of opioids when supporting patients with chronic non-cancer pain. It covers the latest evidence and offers advice on engaging patients to take an active role in managing pain, along with a resource to support patients reduce or stop their opioid medication.

NPS MedicineWise Educational Visits are funded by the Federal Government (and therefore free to practices) and content is accredited by RACGP and ACRRM.

- One-on-one discussion: a 30-minute in-practice discussion for GPs, tailored to individual learning needs.
- Virtual visit: via video call for GPs who find it difficult to schedule an in-practice visit
- **Small-group**: a 1-hour in-practice meeting for up to 10 health professionals (GPs, pharmacists and nurses).
