Latest news and updates

Self-collected cervical screening samples should not be offered until further notice

The National Cervical Screening Program has released an important revision to one of the components on the renewed National Cervical Screening Program launched on 1 December 2017.

The self-collection method has been included in the program to encourage women who are aged 30 years or over and have never had a screening test; or who are overdue for testing by at least two years; and in either case have declined a healthcare provider-collected sample, to participate in cervical screening.

However, self-collection can only be implemented when the laboratory and platform testing processes and equipment attain the various accreditation requirements. Laboratories are not yet accredited to perform the test and therefore the self-collection method is not yet claimable against the MBS.

Healthcare providers who conduct cervical screening tests are advised not to offer the self-collection method to eligible women until further notice. All other aspects of the renewed National Cervical Screening Program will go ahead as scheduled on 1 December 2017.

Communicare changes name

The practice software package commonly referred to as Communicare (DCA Direct Health Pty Ltd, trading as HealthConnex), has changed its name to Telstra Health Pty Ltd.

Users of the software have been advised that as a result of the name change, communications will now come from Telstra health Pty Ltd and not DCA Direct Health Pty ltd. The ABN remains unchanged and no action is required other than perhaps updating your accounts records where required.

Implementing the renewed National Cervical Screening Program

1 December 2017 marked the implementation of the renewed National Cervical Screening Program (NCSP). Significant changes have occurred, with a shift to a primary oncogenic HPV test with partial genotyping, a change in the test interval and screening age ranges, and an option for self-collection. A range of resources are available to support these changes in your practice.

National Indigenous Bowel Screening Project update

Online Module for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Workers

The NIBSP will launch a new Online Training Module as part of a campaign to encourage more Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 50 to 74 to take part in the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program (NBCSP).

The module, *Bowel Screening, no shame - just a part of life*, is designed to provide Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health workers with the skills, knowledge and confidence to talk with their patients about bowel screening through the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program (NBCSP).

The participation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the NBCSP is low, with just 23.5% of those in the eligible age range taking part.

Menzies School of Health Research has been funded by the Australian Government Department of Health to consult, develop, prepare and deliver an initial awareness campaign and in 2018 a national pilot of an alternative option for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to access the NBCSP.

As part of this work, Menzies consulted widely with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Workers, other health professionals, community members, and government and non-government organisations involved in cancer screening and/or primary health care services.

Please note, this version of the module deals with the NBCSP's usual approach of mailing kits directly to individuals. An updated version of the module will be made available for the proposed National Pilot next year.
